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WELCOME TO THE SCHOOL OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE!

Welcome to the School of Criminal Justice at Michigan State University! We are eager to assist you in any way so please seek us out with any questions or concerns. This student planning guide is intended for undergraduate students in the School of Criminal Justice. This guide will help you learn and understand the Criminal Justice degree requirements, MSU policies and procedures relevant to your academics and resources available for students on campus.

Criminal justice offers the opportunity to study fascinating issues of crime and justice. Some of the matters studied are the patterns and causes of crime, the challenges facing criminal justice agencies as they seek to balance crime control with preservation of civil liberties, and the growing importance of security management in what has been called the "risk society".

By declaring Criminal Justice as your major, you have taken an important step in achieving your future goals. The Criminal Justice degree completion requirements include a structured set of courses required by the University, the College of Social Science and the School of Criminal Justice. CJ students typically have significant flexibility to customize their academic experience due to a generous number of elective credits available within the degree structure. Our students participate in high level internships in all areas of the field, study CJ overseas through study abroad opportunities, take a class with incarcerated individuals through the Inside-Out program, and participate in several CJ student run clubs.

ADVISING

The best way to manage your academic and career plan is to meet regularly with an advisor! UNIVERSITY REQUIREMENTS

The following is a short guide of University requirements, however, the Academic Program catalog (<https://reg.msu.edu/AcademicPrograms/>) is the official source for University requirements.

- Complete a minimum of 120 credits with a 2.0 minimum MSU GPA.
- Achieve a 2.0 or better Criminal Justice cumulative GPA.
- Complete a minimum of 30 credits at MSU with a minimum of 27 credits on the East Lansing campus after junior status.
- Earn a minimum of 18 CJ credits at MSU.
- Courses used to satisfy specific degree requirements may not be taken for CR/NC.
- No more than 10 of a student’s last 30 credits may be transferred in. PRIOR APPROVAL IS REQUIRED.
- A maximum of 60 credits can be accepted from a community college.
 - Before taking a course at another institution, please understand the MSU Policy on transferability of courses. For more information, go to transfer.msu.edu and consult an advisor.

COLLEGE OF SOCIAL SCIENCE REQUIREMENTS

Experiential Learning Requirement

All students within the College of Social Science must complete an experiential learning requirement. The experiential learning requirement may be satisfied either within or outside the requirements of the major. The requirement may be met by completing a 3 or 4-credit experiential learning course, approved by the College of Social Science Committee on Curriculum and Academic Policy or its designee. A list of approved courses is maintained by the College of Social Science. Study abroad and study away experiences, internships, service learning and civic engagement experiences, undergraduate research, including, in appropriate cases, honors theses, and entrepreneurship experiences can meet this requirement. Breadth Requirement

The College of Social Science requires each student to complete a breadth requirement. The requirement can be fulfilled by completing any of the following: (1) any minor in the College of Social Science, with a maximum of two courses from the student's primary major counting towards requirements of the minor; (2) a second degree or additional major within the College of Social Science; (3) a second degree or additional major in a college other than the College of Social Science; or (4) a minor outside of the College of Social Science. A maximum of two courses from the student's primary major may count towards requirements of the minor. It is encouraged that you meet with your College of Social Science academic advisor to discuss which option is best for your degree plan.

College Credit Distribution Requirements

1. Complete a minimum of 30 credits in courses numbered at the 300 level and above.
2. A maximum of 12 semester credits of independent study* may be applied toward degree requirements (see #4).
3. A maximum of 12 semester credits of internships and field experience credits may be applied toward the degree requirements (see #4).
4. The total of independent study, internship and field experience credits may not exceed 20 credits.

Note: A maximum of 6 credits may be earned in CJ 490.

GENERAL ELECTIVES

General Electives are any courses that do not meet a specific course requirement. This is your chance to explore and expand your knowledge in other areas of interest. These courses count towards the 120 minimum credits required for graduation. When completing electives, you can take a diversity of courses from all different disciplines. If you would rather have them more focused, you may choose to complete a minor or an additional major.

MINORS

ADDITIONAL MAJOR

With the permission of the relevant department and college, a student who is enrolled in or has completed a Michigan State University bachelor's degree program may elect to complete the requirements for an additional major. An additional major may be completed within the number of credits required for the student's bachelor's degree program or with only such additional credits necessary to satisfy the requirements for the additional major. The additional major consists of the specified requirements of the major and, where required, of the college.

A student interested in completing an additional major should contact the advisor of the intended additional major.

The completion of the additional major will be noted on the student's final transcript. Only the primary major of the student's bachelor's degree program will be designated on the student's diploma.

SECOND DEGREE

To pursue a second bachelor's degree, a student must be admitted to the second bachelor's degree program. To be granted a second bachelor's degree, a student must earn at least 30 credits in residence in addition to the credits required for the first degree and meet the specified requirements of the second college and major. A student who completes the requirements for a second bachelor's degree will receive two diplomas, one for each major.

MINOR IN SECURITY MANAGEMENT

The complexities of modern society have combined to generate a variety of threats to business organizations, information networks, government installations and operations, and individuals. The Minor in Security Management is designed for students who are interested in private and government security.

With the approval of the department or school and college that administer the student's degree program, the courses that are used to satisfy the requirements for the minor may also be used to satisfy the requirements for the bachelor's degree.

CONCENTRATION IN CYBER INVESTIGATIONS

An optional concentration in Cyber Investigations is available for students completing a Bachelor of Arts degree in Criminal Justice. The Cyber Investigations concentration equips students with the skills and knowledge needed to combat cybercrime and conduct digital forensic investigations. With the rise of identity theft, data breaches, and cyber espionage, and other forms of online criminal activity, this program prepares graduates for careers in law enforcement, corporate security, and other sectors requiring specialized investigative expertise.

Students must complete all of the following courses listed below. Courses that are used to satisfy the requirements for the concentration may also be used to satisfy the requirements for the Bachelor of Arts degree in Criminal Justice. The concentration will be noted on the student's transcript.

Please note: This concentration is only available to students completing a Bachelor of Arts degree in Criminal Justice. To request this concentration, please contact your Criminal Justice major advisor.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Graduation Application: Applications for graduation should be submitted by the first week of the preceding semester the student anticipates completing degree requirements on student.msu.edu.

Change of Enrollment/Registration: Students can add courses through the fifth day of classes. To add courses after the fifth day, students must go through the department offering the course to see if a late add would be possible. Students can drop courses up to the middle of the semester. After the middle of the semester, students may drop courses only with the permission of the dean of their college. Students will only be able to drop a course after the middle of the semester to correct errors in enrollment or because of catastrophic events). Classification of Students: For the purposes of registration and determining eligibility for certain student activities, a classification of students by class year is made by the Office of the Registrar at the end of each semester based on the number of credits earned:

Freshman = 1 – 27 credits

Sophomore = 28 – 55 credits

Junior = 56 – 87 credits

Senior = 88 and above credits.

Final Exams: No student is required to take more than two final examinations during any one day of finals week. Criminal Justice students who have three or more exams scheduled for the same day may take their class schedule to the Office of Student Affairs for the College of Social Science, (SSC.AcademicAffairs@msu.edu), for assistance in arranging an alternative time for one of the three final exams. <https://socialscience.msu.edu/undergraduate/current-students/advising-affairs.html>

Major Change: Major changes into the College of Social Science require a meeting with the Academic Advisor for that major. This meeting is to review the major, completed coursework and remaining requirements.

Repeat Policy: Undergraduate students can repeat a course no matter the previous grade. Undergraduate students who enrolled in a course for CR, or P cannot repeat the course on a credit basis. Students may repeat a course for a maximum of two times for three total enrollments and can repeat a maximum of 20 credits.
