The scholarship meant so much to me because I came to MSU with a really big dream and not much money to fund it. My mother was a single mother and worked three jobs to support us, but didn't have anything left over for my college, so I knew these dreams were not going to be easy to come by. I had chosen MSU because of its superior Criminal Justice Program that I felt would make me more competitive when I joined the workforce. I could not have been more correct in that assumption.

I graduated from MSU with a B.S in Psychology and a B.A. in Criminal Justice in 2005. I went on to earn a Masters of Science Degree in Criminology from the University of Cincinnati in 2007. After school, I worked in the private sector for about 4 years but I felt I wasn't fulfilling the lifelong need I had to help others. In 2011, I joined the South Bend (Indiana) Police Department and began my journey in helping others. In 2016, after a competitive interview process, I was selected to become a detective in the St. Joseph County Special Victims Unit where I have been very successful in helping those who I believe need it the most. My time at MSU not only taught me the proper skills to be a good investigator, but they taught me how to be a more understanding, empathetic and open minded person, which is key to success in the criminal justice field today.
